SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT PLAN (SWMP)

DRAFT PLAN MONITORING ADVISORY COMMITTEE (PMAC) *TERMS OF REFERENCE*

Purpose

To provide multi-stakeholder advice to CSRD Staff on related issues identified through the implementation of the Solid Waste Management Plan (SWMP), including: policy, new initiatives, plan amendments, community feedback, staff reports, program performance, public consultation, future updates, etc.

Objectives

1. To receive feedback representative of the community at large.
2. To consider information in an open, transparent forum.
3. To monitor the progress of policy implementation.
4. To provide advice that is independent from the CSRD staff and elected officials.
5. To include the community at large during the decision-making process.
6. To provide an initial forum for community members and solid waste companies to make presentations if they are relevant to future of the SWMP.

Structure of the PMAC

a) Members

The 22-member (maximum) PMAC represents organizations or individuals interested in solid waste management and will primarily reflect community interests, including:

- Local environmental groups and recycling organizations (1 member)
- Public Works representatives from municipalities within the Regional District (4 members)
- CSRD staff (non-voting) (2 members)
- Large commercial and institutional solid waste generators, haulers, and operators (1 member)
- Operators or owners of private solid waste facilities (1 member)
- First Nations within the CSRD (5 members; 1 member from each band)
- Representation from the Provincial Ministry of Environment (1 member)
- Organizations with experience in the collection, sorting, processing, transporting, or marketing of recyclables (1 member)
- Interested members of the public (6 members; 1 member from each electoral area)

b) Members' Term of Office

In the first year, ½ of the voting members will be appointed for a one year term and ½ of the voting members will be appointed for a two year term. In subsequent years, members will be appointed for two year terms. The term of office for each member appointed by the CSRD Board will coincide with the calendar year.

Meetings of the PMAC

a) Regular Meetings

Dates for the regular quarterly PMAC meetings will be determined by the PMAC during the first scheduled meeting. Locations for meeting will be offered throughout the CSRD and will be specified by PMAC consensus.

Special PMAC meetings may be called as-needed at some agreeable location as issues emerge at PMAC's discretion.

Agendas will be posted on the CSRD website at www.csr.bc.ca.

b) Minutes

Minutes recorded at all PMAC meetings will be less formal and will focus more on action items produced by the Committee. The minutes will be posted on the CSRD website at www.csr.bc.ca.

TASKS OF THE PMAC

The PMAC will:

- Review and understand background information, including the SWMP (Appendix A); past Annual Reports; and the Plan Vision, Guiding Principles, and Decision-making Process (Appendix B).
- Stay current on related issues by reading the Recycling Council of British Columbia's (RCBC's) *Recap* and *Reiterate* publications when forwarded by CSRD staff.
- Undertake related readings and review of information provided.
- Attend meetings, as required.
- Provide input, feedback, and recommendations, including identifying potential opportunities and strategies for consideration. The results of the PMAC's review will be used by CSRD staff, including recommendations for changes, additions, or deletions from the SWMP and related reports.
- Ensure staff reports to the Board are consistent with the SWMP's Vision, Guiding Principles, and Decision-Making Process.

- Review and provide input on the public consultation processes with area residents affected by the SWMP, including: plans for broader communications, media relations, and the timing and location of consultation sessions with the community. Assist with various public meetings and open house events.
- Contribute to the identification of program performance measurement tools to monitor SWMP implementation.
- Contribute to the development of annual reports describing the performance of SWMP programs which will be submitted to the CSRD Board, and make recommendations to improve, where reasonable.

Committee Decision-making

The PMAC will provide recommendations to CSRD Staff for amendments to the SWMP. Ideally, decisions recommended by the Committee will be made by consensus. If necessary, a vote will be taken with 2/3 majority to pass. A quorum will be defined as 50 percent of the membership in attendance. Minority reports or information reflecting a different perspective may also be submitted if any member wishes to do so.

Committee Protocol

- The PMAC will receive nominations and elect a Chair and a Vice Chair at its first regular meeting.
- All PMAC members are equal and have equal opportunity to contribute at meetings, as well as responsibility to respect the opinions of others. Committee members are encouraged to actively participate in the discussions and use their experience, education, and insight to speak freely about any issues or opportunities to be considered.
- Committee members are present to give a voice to the community. However, members are equally responsible to listen and understand the views of others. It is only through this dialogue that real consensus can be achieved.
- Members are encouraged to work collaboratively and to be committed to reaching consensus where possible by using an interest-based approach rather than an individual member position-based approach. Consensus will be formally recorded in the meeting's Minutes. In certain circumstances, issues raised during the course of a meeting may require a formal motion and vote. Any members unable to agree with the consensus decision may have their objections noted in the Minutes.
- Committee members may choose to express their personal views about the process to others outside the PMAC but may not speak on behalf of or in any way create the impression that they are speaking for the PMAC as a whole. In order to ensure open and honest dialogue, Committee members should not discuss comments or opinions expressed by other Committee members without their knowledge and consent.
- Members will be asked to arrive promptly at meetings.
- CSRD staff will be present at meetings as a resource for the PMAC.

- Members of the public may observe meetings but will not have voting rights or speaking rights unless invited to speak by the Chair.
- Members who miss three consecutive Committee meetings may have their membership revoked at the PMAC’s discretion.
- A Conflict of Interest arises when a PMAC member speaks or votes on a motion that could be the cause of some direct significant benefit - monetary or otherwise - to that member. If such a situation arises, the member involved should excuse themselves from proceedings that relate to the conflict unless explicitly requested to speak, only after a majority vote to do so. Any subsequent information provided by the individual will clearly be identified in the Minutes as coming from a source perceived to be in a conflict of interest.

Resources

CSRD staff will provide administrative support to the PMAC including, but not limited to: arranging meetings, creating agendas, taking minutes, and distributing materials.

Any PMAC budget requirements will be included within the SWMP budget subject to the CSRD’s normal annual review and approval process.

PMAC participation is voluntary with no remuneration provided for members’ time. Travel remuneration will be expensed through established CSRD policy.

From TM 4, policies warranting no further investigation for the purpose of the SWMP are identified in Exhibit 2. These policy statements would be written into the SWMP in their current form or tailored to suit each waste shed if necessary.
